# **Getting to Know Your Bible**

Who are pastors, elders, overseers, and bishops?

In the Bible, these people were appointed in each church (Acts 14:23, Titus 1:5) to look after the welfare of the entire church on all levels, from personal care to the teachings/beliefs/direction of a church (1 Peter 5:1-4, Titus 1:9).

### All but one of the terms describe the same people:

"Elders" (Grk. *presbyteros*) and "Overseers/Bishops" (Grk. *episkopos*) are the same people ("bishop" is the older translation of the same word translated "overseer" in our Bibles today).

"Pastor" (Grk. *poimen*), as used in the Bible, is used only once as a noun to describe a church leader (Ephesians 4:11). However, "pastor" as a verb is used to describe the activity of Elders (Acts 20:28, 1 Peter 5:2). Because of this, some churches consider pastors and elders to be the same thing. Others see a distinction between the two (Ethnos' view).

Notice how the words are used interchangeably:

17 From Miletus, Paul sent to Ephesus for the <u>elders</u> of the church. 18 When they arrived, he said to them... "28 Keep watch over yourselves and all the flock of which the Holy Spirit has made you <u>overseers</u>. <u>Be shepherds</u> of the church of God, which he bought with his own blood." Acts 20:17,28

## Each church had at least 2 elders:

Note Acts 14:23, Acts 20:17, Titus 1:5. This diversity allows for creativity and acts against the pitfalls of having one leader who "call all the shots."

## People could be elders only if they fit these qualifications:

I Tim 3:2-7, Titus 1:6-9. This is key, especially because leadership is really based on character.

## Why is it important that we know this?

God's community is not run like a business with a CEO or like the government where the will of the people govern everything. It's organized His way, with Jesus as our top leader (Ephesians 4:15). Learning about this helps us work together and fulfill His mission in a more powerful and effective way.
